



Definition

• <u>Simple</u>: Any activity that promotes <u>direct</u> engagement between government and communities <u>for</u> better government performance

• World Bank: Social accountability is the range of actions or strategies, beyond voting, that societal actors, namely citizens, employ to hold the state to account (OMeally, 2013)





SA vs CLD

Social Accountability

- Niche, targetted civic education
- Political space between communities and government
- Mentoring for communities to lobby government once NGOs exit
- Compelling evidence

CLD

- May or may not have civic education
- May or may not create political space
- May or may not support communities 'political empowerment'
- Many approaches and fragmented evidence






Impact



scores in I year






Oxford University RCT impact of the CVA Score Card in 100 Ugandan schools.

Evidence 2017-2019

- 3IE systematic review May 2019
- Proliferation of RCTs in health
- DFID major macro evaluation of all SA projects June 2016:
- Now <u>"compelling"</u> evidence that SA <u>"alm ost always"</u> impacts service delivery (DFID)
- Major USAID 2017 review of the evidence for accountability in health highlighted important role for services scorecards (CVA) and participatory budgeting



meeting, community representatives present the results of the Monitoring Standards session and the Community Scorecard sessions. Participants review the proposals that have emerged from the process thus far.

Next, ask the community to prioritize some objectives to be included in a collective action plan. The objectives should be "SMART" – Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Realistic, and Time-Bound. Record these objectives on a flip chart like the one below, and ensure that those involved are truly committed to its implementation. Sometimes, these objectives will require the formation of a working group to effectively implement.
